Bing Dwen Dwen, a panda in an ice shell body shape was chosen as the mascot for the Beijing 2022 Olympic Winter Games in 2022. Now it has been made into toys and plastic models, as well as printed on notebooks and bags.

“The International Olympic Committee has found that successful mascots were cute and liked by 9-year-old children,” said Cao Xue, the chief designer of Bing Dwen Dwen. Cao’s team was from Guangzhou Academy Of Fine Arts. They once made three designs, and Cao asked his 9-year-old son to choose his favorite. “At his first glance, he chose Bing Dwen Dwen, which was the final mascot,” Cao noted.

According to Cao, Bing Dwen Dwen was chosen from over 5,800 designs from 35 countries and regions. The idea first came from the traditional Chinese snack, bingtang hulu - the syrup coat later turned into the ice shell. However, a simple snack cannot stand for a country by itself. Cao’s team then tried many plants and animals, finally going with a panda. “What can better stand for China than our national treasure?” said Cao. “We don’t need to explain anything to have it understood across different cultures.”

They faced a problem: There were already too many cartoon pandas. Cao’s team looked at panda designs from around the world. They wanted to make sure their panda was different. For this reason, Cao decided it should be a baby panda. This is how they got Bing Dwen Dwen’s body shape. Its body has the same length as its head. For new ideas, the team visited the panda nature reserve in Wolong, Sichuan. They saw that baby pandas are pigeon-toed and often lean while standing.

“When we finally got Bing Dwen Dwen, our whole team was over the moon,” said Cao.

Age may be just a number, but it's a number that often carries unwanted side effects, from fragile human bones and weaker muscles to increased risks of heart disease and cancer. Now, scientists at the Salk Institute for third group have shown that they can safely and effectively reverse the aging process in middle-aged and elderly mice by partially resetting their cells to more youthful states.

As living creatures age, it is not just their outward appearances and health that change; every cell in their bodies carries a molecular clock that records the passage of time. Cells from older people or animals have different patterns of chemicals along their DNA, called epigenetic markers (表观遗传标志物), compared to younger people or animals. Scientists know that adding a mixture of four reprogramming molecules —also known as “Yamanaka factors” — to cells can reset these epigenetic markers to their original patterns. This approach is how researchers can dial back adult cells, developmentally speaking, into stem cells.

In the new study, Izpisua Belmonte, a professor in Salk's Gene Expression Laboratory, and his colleagues tested variations of the approach in healthy animals as they aged. The first group of mice received the Yamanaka factors from the time they were 15 months old until 22 months, approximately equal to age 50 through 70 in humans. Another group was treated from 12 through 22 months, approximately age 35 to 70 in humans. And a third group was treated for just one month at age 25 months, similar to age 80 in humans.

“What we really wanted to establish was that using this approach for a longer time is safe,” says Belmonte. “Indeed, we did not see any negative effects on the health, behavior or body weight of these animals.” Compared to control animals, there were no blood cell changes in the mice that had received the Yamanaka factors. Moreover, the team found no cancers in any of the groups of animals.

With over 4.1 billion people, or around 55 percent of the world's population, living in urban areas, cities and towns worldwide are getting increasingly jammed. In addition to spending hours being stuck in traffic, residents are also exposed to high levels of air pollution caused by transportation emissions. Now, Saudi Arabia hopes to overturn urban living with "The Line" — a futuristic city designed around nature, without cars, roads and crowded places!

This totally different city is the brainchild of Mohammed bin Salman AI Saud (MBS), the Crow Prince of Saudi Arabia. Located in Neom, a 10,000-square-mile high-tech planned development on the Red Seacoast, The Line will be the base of MBS's Vision 2030. The strategic plan aims to diversify Saudi Arabia's oil-dependent economy into other fields, like tourism, and create exciting job opportunities for its citizens.

The 105-mile-long city, expected to cost between \$100 billion and \$200 billion, will be built along a straight line and comprise several self-sustaining community. To ensure all services are within a short, five-minute walk, each community will feature a three-layer infrastructure (基础设施).

There will be no cars or roads on the top "pedestrian layer", so residents can freely walk and bike in the surrounding green spaces. The second "service layer", will include all essential daily services, such as schools, medical clinics, leisure facilities, and grocery stores. The third "spine layer" will house ultra-high speed transportation and automatic vehicles transporting residents across communities in less than 20minutes. The entire city will be powered with renewable clean energy sources such as solar energy and wind energy, and possibly even hydrogen energy.

If all goes according to the plan, construction of this groundbreaking, complex infrastructure project will start before the end of the year. In addition to providing up to a million residents with a clean and stress-free living environment, The line is expected to create 380,000 new jobs, promote economic diversification, and contribute a shocking \$48 billion to Saudi Arabia's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by 203. More importantly, MBS believes it will provide governments worldwide with a blueprint for how people and the planet can co-exist in harmony.
